## Religious Education and Catholic Life at St Joseph's

We welcomed the new calendar year with the whole school observing and celebrating the feast of the Epiphany. Years 4, 5 and 6 went to mass at St Joseph's church, whilst Reception, Year 1, 2 and 3 had a liturgy led in school by our Faith leaders with Father Tony.

We had our school interim focus visit from the Diocese led by Anna Flood, the Primary schools advisor who came in and observed a wonderful collective worship session led by our Faith leaders and a variety of lessons. We were incredibly pleased with the outcomes of the day.

Mrs Osman has been working alongside Jan from CAFOD to present workshops to Years 3 and 4 on Catholic social teaching. Catholic social teaching (CST) is rooted in Scripture, formed by the wisdom of Church leaders, and influenced by grassroots movements. It is our moral compass, guiding us on how to live out our faith in the world. These workshops will continue next term for all other year groups. The children thoroughly enjoyed the sessions and learnt about how to care for others, especially those in need. To care for our world. Ali in Year 4 shared with me that, 'That no matter what your religion, skin colour, race or gender you should always be included.' Following the completion of the workshops the entire school will be celebrating Catholic social teaching day led by Mrs Osman on Tuesday 4th July 2023.

Year 1 celebrated St David's day, their year group saint, by leading an assembly to share with us and their families' facts about him and what makes him special as a saint.

Mrs Barnes and the Faith leaders led an assembly to the rest of the school where they gifted each class a vase of daffodils to celebrate and honour St David.





Year 3 led us in celebration for St Patrick's day, with Irish dancers helping to share and celebrate Irish culture.

The season of Lent began with Year 4, 5 and 6 attending mass and receiving ashes. Then at school a liturgy was held and the dispersal of ashes for Reception to Year 3.

Over the course of Lent Mrs Osman has asked the children to challenge themselves and each other to take on the Big Lent Walk for CAFOD. The challenge was to walk when and where they choose over the 40 days, alone or with friends and think about how we can fight global poverty. Mrs Osman would like to thank you all for your encouragement and support. Please can all sponsor forms and any money raised be brought into school on Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> April 2023.

Year 4 led stations of the cross for the entire school on Wednesday, a great opportunity for the Easter story to be brought alive for the entire school community. As classes, the children then had a further opportunity to visit and discuss the stations that were set up around the school site for further prayer and reflection time. Luke from Year 4 said that, 'Just like Simon we should care for everyone' and 'In the toughest of times always believe that God is with you.' They have taken much of what they learnt from Catholic social teaching and applied it to how Jesus and his friends cared for us.



Mrs Barnes and Mrs Ogilvie have done an amazing job again coordinating reconciliation for Years 4, 5 and 6 on Monday and Tuesday to help children reflect and prepare for Easter. Our thanks to Fr Tony and Fr Binoy for coming into the school to offer this sacrament to our children.

A big thank you to 5E for their assembly on Lent - which helped us to reflect and think of how we are preparing for Easter.



This year's Reception classes have been following the new RE curriculum. Lots of our learning is through story books and thanks to the Book Fair, we were able to purchase these new books for our summer topic called 'Dialogue and Encounter.' It has been lovely to have been able to go into the classes and listen to and chat to them about their learning. When looking at a picture of people gathered to listen to Jesus, a child shared that ' It was like when Jesus was born everyone wanted to come and see him.' Amazing to see them making the links between different stages in Jesus' life.

## To maintain a neat and tidy school uniform, we ask that:

- Skirts should be an appropriate length and of a style which allows girls to sit comfortably on the floor.
- Shoes should be flat, black and appropriate for school. Your child should wear shoes
  which he or she can manage to do up independently. Please do not send your child
  to school in shoes which prevent them from running in the playground.
- Hair longer than shoulder length must be tied back at all times and hair bands/clips etc must be navy, black or brown.
- · Children should not wear make-up, coloured hair or nail varnish.
- Children need a change of clothes and footwear for PE (for health and hygiene reasons) and a bag in which to keep the kit at school.
- All school uniform and PE kit MUST be clearly named. Children can become upset as a result of lost clothing, so please help us by naming everything.
- For health and safety reasons, children are not permitted to wear earrings or any other jewellery for PE. Your child's teacher will advise you when PE lessons take place so that earrings can be removed.
